Kirsty from Rhubarb Theatre writes about their tour of 10 East Lindsey primary schools, supported by funding through Arts Council England and the Cultural Education Partnership led by Lincolnshire Music Service

It's another early start, it's boiling outside, I'm already feeling sweaty in my many layers of costumes and the show hasn't even started yet! However, the excitement radiating from the children and staff more than makes up for the bumpy start. And once the performance begins, the room is

filled with laughter and magic.

'Finding Chester' is Rhubarb Theatre's new primary touring show. It's a fun packed journey around the UK, using theatrical techniques from puppetry, mask, dance, shadow and song. It also deals with some serious issues, such as isolation and mental health, both of which children are more aware of since lockdown.

Rhubarb Theatre were in early stages of conception when we were contacted by Lincolnshire Music Service with the idea of applying for Cultural Education Funding.

Thanks to the success of their fundraising, we have started our mini tour into 10 East Lindsey Primary Schools. Funding has also allowed us to create a teachers' support pack which keys into the themes of the show as well as ideas on bringing drama and the arts into the classroom.

We're halfway through the project, but the feedback has been excellent and we're hoping to reach much more of Lincolnshire by next spring.



Music for Youth National Festival!

Following a fabulous Music for Youth (MFY) Regional Festival in Boston on Saturday 18th March, several Lincolnshire groups were selected to perform at the MFY National Festival in Birmingham.

Music for Youth is a national youth arts charity working to provide young people aged 21 and under across the UK with free, life-changing performance and progression opportunities, regardless of background or musical style. Established in 1970, their mission is simple: they believe that music, and the chance to participate in high-quality musical activities, should be open to every young person.

The Music for Youth National Festival was

a two-day feast of live music. Audiences had the opportunity to enjoy performances from talented young musicians, from jazz, soul and funk groups to choirs, orchestras and much more.

The UpRising Inclusive Choir, in partnership with Soundabout, is a musical community without barriers, open to all young people aged up to 25. It focusses on giving a voice to people with severe and profound learning disabilities. Choir co-leader Hannah Bourne says,

"We believe that everybody deserves to have a voice. Rather than focusing on what people can't do, we want to emphasise what they can do. We believe that people with severe and profound learning disabilities should have a life full of expression, passion and enjoyment. To enable this to happen

we aim to educate, support and empower all those in our...

...community. That's why we use sound to enable our participants to express themselves, connect with others and feel the warmth of music.

The MEHEM wide online rehearsals are delivered in partnership with Derbyshire and Leicestershire music hubs and have been taking place every fortnight via zoom. Our 'in person' rehearsals have happened every half term at St Francis School, Lincoln.

MEHEM Uprising! is a three-year Youth Music funded project to improve the quality and consistency of music-making opportunities for young people with additional needs across the region. It's not too late to join the choir, we'd love to see you there!

Making music accessible for all

It's long been an aim of the National Plan for Music education to provide opportunities for every child to experience learning to play a musical instrument. The new National Plan: 'The power of music to change lives' confirms that all children should be provided equitable opportunity to access instrumental tuition.

This year Lincolnshire Music Service is proud to have partnered with The OMHI Trust Home (ohmi.org.uk) in supporting this aim. This partnership has demonstrated the endless possibilities to ensure every child can experience the joy of making music. Several children have benefited from adapted learning opportunities, including one handed ukulele playing and a grant to purchase a specially adapted violin bow through Project Limitless - Prosthetics for Children | Koalaa (vourkoalaa.com) Two members of our leadership team are also now trained to carry out needs assessments and all staff have been involved in CPD to learn more about adaptive instrumental teaching.

Harrison is a Year 3 pupil at The

Magdalen Church of England/ Methodist Primary School, Wainfleet. He has spinal muscular atrophy, and following an initial assessment, Harrison was able to fully participate in a Samba project alongside his classmates. "Having resources and weighted beaters has enabled him to be able to fully participate and enjoy all of the lessons" comments Harrison's class teacher.

Harrison commented, "I have been able to use the beaters as they fit better in my hands. Having the stands means I can do the music myself and not need a grown up to help me."

His classmate Havva added, "I think it makes Harrison happy that he can join in and do the same as everyone else .

LMS tutor Rob says, "Given Harrison's limited strength and range of movement, I am certain that the equipment provided has meant that he went from being potentially unable to participate at all to making a genuine, independent contribution." What a success story!

XR Piano Project

Music education through virtual reality LMS is involved in a pioneering project using VR headsets in piano lessons

The National Plan for Music Education, which maps out the delivery of music education in England from 2022-2030. underlines the importance of understanding the role that technology can play in teaching music. The Royal College of Music (RCM), alongside Music Education Hubs in Wiltshire. Leicestershire. Norfolk and Lincolnshire, and several secondary schools, are working together on a exciting experiment to explore the potential role of virtual reality technology in helping to make music education more innovative, accessible and inclusive.

Led by music education, technology and inclusion specialist Ben Sellers, the XR Piano project is giving pupils the chance to work alongside experienced piano/ keyboard teachers to explore learning to play the piano using special software on VR headsets. Piano tutors and beginner pupils worked on the project throughout the summer term. Pupils used a VR headset during their lessons, and took the headset home to practise with. Researchers from the RCM will gather data from tutor diaries, questionnaires and focus groups. From this we will consider whether access to VR increases pupil engagement and progress, including their motivation to practise at home.

'Control' groups of learners will be taught without the use of VR to enable the two approaches to be compared.

Through this partnership, we hope to create an environment in which technologists, tutors and researchers can work together to create the best possible learning opportunities for pupils, increase pupil retention, and keep learning fun and relevant well into the 21st century.





Singsation had a small break during the Spring term, but it's back with a sell-out event at the New Theatre Royal Lincoln. Twenty one schools and over 800 students took part in an interactive session with Hayley Sanderson, lead vocalist on Strictly Come Dancing, and her brilliant band of professional musicians. Students learned new material and rehearsed one of

Hayley's marvellous medleys to perform. Hayley and the band also performed songs for the students so they enjoyed one of the UK's best session vocalists and songwriters in action.

The audience was also treated to a special video introduction from Strictly star judge, Craig Revel Horwood! Offering words of encouragement, Craig said, "Top tips from

me – full out and have fun. You're going to be fabulous!"

Some schools also took part in the performance - hopefully creating some of those WOW moments to remember and treasure. Who knows if this moment in the spotlight might create the next best stage performer!



Our two County Groups, Lincolnshire Youth String Orchestra and Lincolnshire Youth Wind Orchestra, completed a residential course at Repton School, and performed at a fabulous concert in Lincoln Cathedral.

Students have worked hard over the last nine months to produce a wonderful programme of music ranging from Elgar's 'Pomp and Circumstance March Number 4 (heard recently at the coronation) to the Finale from Sibelius' Symphony Number 2, to Holst's Suite in Eb, Selections from

'Encanto' and 'Indiana Jones'.

The orchestras were inspired by a full audience at Lincoln Cathedral. They rose to the challenge, giving a wonderful performance and making LMS staff proud of the young musicians' achievements.

Many members of the orchestra will return in July when both orchestras travel to Salamanca, Spain, for a seven-day concert tour. Venues include Iglesia de Santiago in Cigales, Palacio Figueroa and Cathedral Vieja in Salamanca, and Castillo de Tiedra.

Lincolnshire Music Service is delighted to be able to offer an overseas visit this year, the last one being to Leipzig, Germany, in 2019 before the pandemic. Many of the young people who were members back then have moved on, so we are very excited that for the vast majority, this will be their first orchestral tour.



Nettleham Junior & St Francis Special School Pupils Join Up

Tina Clynes, teacher at St Francis Special School, Lincoln writes about how welcoming students from Nettleham Junior school were to pupils from her school during a joint drumming project.

Since November 2022, Tina was attending drumming sessions at Nettleham Junior School, run by the Lincolnshire Music Service. Mr Gibbons, head teacher suggested drumming sessions and joining Year 4. Hannah Bourne was the LMS music lead and went above and beyond to make the sessions inclusive. Each week I would bring three of my pupils, aged between 9 and 18, with complex medical and learning needs.

I have been looking for enrichment and social inclusion opportunities, but I could not have imagined how positive this experience could become. Teachers at Nettleham, said their students were always really happy to welcome us, and would take it in turns to be our 'welcoming committee'. Two Nettleham pupils have told me they would like to work in a special school when they are older.

The children in Year 4 wanted to engage with the pupils and to help them access the instruments. My pupils were able to listen and join in with 30 amazing young people while they played different types of drums and percussion instruments. I would welcome any opportunities to joint work with other schools and the Lincolnshire Music Service in the future.





It's been another great year here at Access Creative Lincoln. This year finally feels like the dark days of the pandemic are behind us and we have begun branching out and re-establishing connections. This has also meant our Music, Games and Media students have been able to go on trips again, and have enjoyed private cinema visits to the Everyman Cinema, trips to Lincoln University's media and music departments, a visit to dBs Manchester for a day of workshops and many more.

As we approach the summer holidays we are looking forward to hosting Lincolnshire Music Services' summer events.

In partnership with Lincolnshire Music Service staff, and with support from Sleaford Concert Band and members of the RAF bands, Carre's Grammar School, Sleaford hosted an inspirational day of music making on 4th July.

Over 150 children plus some adult players rehearsed and performed America by Bernstein (it was Independence Day after all!) along with music by Joseph Bologne, Le Chevalier de St George, Feeling Good (young trumpeter Billy Richardson came specially from Cambridge to play the original Michael Bublé vocal line). It

finished with I Wan'na Be Like You from Jungle Book.

Families enjoyed hearing students play a huge variety of instruments from sousaphone and euphonium to cello, keyboard, guitar, flute, clarinet and more! The celebration of cultural diversity included a neglected Symphony by an 18th century black composer who had worked with Mozart.

Students from 8 to 18 took part - some were new to playing, while others were experienced musicians aiming for careers

in music. Raahil, a young composer, also played the piano at the concert and said it was "a great experience" being able to play in such a large ensemble. Ollie, another keyboard player, added 'A lot of students were really nervous at the beginning of the day, but because we spent all day rehearsing it, we were all really confident about performing'. Ruth Quinton, head of music at Carre's, was the guiding genius behind the event that has run for over 8 years, and arranged much of the music. The students will definitely be back for more next year!
